

# Maples Face Pontiac In Final Contest

A good battle is in store for the fans who attend the Pontiac-Baldwin basketball clash tomorrow evening at Pontiac High School gymnasium on West Huron Street. It is the final game of the regular season.

With a record of four wins and eight defeats, the Chiefs have encountered some of the toughest opposition in the state. They have defeated Bay City, Owosso, Ferndale, and Flint Northern, while defeats have been inflicted twice each by Flint Central, Saginaw Arthur Hill and Saginaw Eastern, while single losses have been handed out by Bay City and Flint Northern. Five of these defeats have been by margins of less than five points.

The main factor in the Pontiac attack is Jack Chalk Ball, high-scoring forward. The probable center for the Chiefs is Hal Anderson, forward; Ross, center; and Jones and Furlong, guards.

The Maples also have encountered first class opposition while winning seven and losing six games. Defeats have been taken from Ann Arbor, Royal Oak, Toledo Maaborn, Alumni, Hazel Park and Ferndale. The Maroons have defeated Keeport Harbor, Cranbrook, Lincoln Park, Henry Ford, Plymouth, Roseville, and East Detroit.

The Birmingham starting five will probably be selected from Paul Kelley, Bob Hopper, Jo Armstrong, Dick Hopkins, Stan Peterson, Newell Wright, Fred Zoellin, and Jack Steelman. The regular lineup has varied in each game.

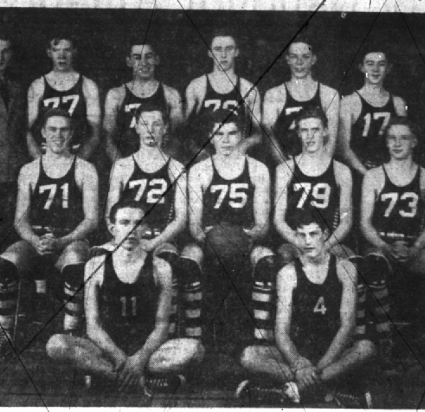

Birmingham just worked the ball around the first quarter and the two teams remained abreast at 7-7 in favor of East Detroit. Putting the team, the Maple team ran away from East Detroit, in the second frame by scoring 16 points to lead East Detroit at the half 23-9.

With a 14-point lead in their favor in the third quarter, the Birmingham team was content to play an easy game and let their opponents be the aggressors.
