Not Military, But Exciting

Pet. Millard Plumstead, of Birmingham, recently had an exciting experience, as related in the following article, reprinted from the Los Angeles Examiner:

"I was home late last night when I was shot by a soldier to whom his terrorized wife appealed for aid was the strange frenzy to which Lester Donald East, 48, veteran of the first World War war gave yesterday, brought to a halt."

East was wounded in the leg by Private W. J. Hudson after he had threatened to kill Mrs. East and three of his seven children and had attacked another soldier, Private Millard Plumstead, and a civilian, Cayetano Quijawa.

48 Women Attend Fire Prevention Class

Register now!

The first class in home fire prevention, sponsored by the Birmingham Civilian Defense Council, started Tuesday morning at the Community house with an enrollment of 48 women. Mrs. Charles D. McCall is instructor of the Tuesday class. Another class is being started at 8 o'clock in the Community House this evening under the direction of Mrs. W. H. Jackson.

It is hoped that eventually every woman in Birmingham will be enrolled. New classes will be started immediately. Registration for these classes can be made at the office of Public Relations Service of Civilian Defense in the Community House.

The people teaching these classes received an intensive course of instruction from Chief Verion W. Griffith and George Jones of the Birmingham Fire Department. The people of Birmingham must know the precautions and preparations necessary to protect their property. If property is damaged by fire, the loss is too heavily to bear. The public is urged to take the information given in these classes as quickly as possible—it is the individual citizen's responsibility.

Everyone must make every effort to safeguard Birmingham homes from fire. Not only because fire protection facilities may be limited in times of emergency, but because it is becoming increasingly difficult to replace many household appliances and materials for home construction. At these times homes are unprotected by fire insurance if property is damaged by fire.

Each course of instruction consists of only three meetings. The first meeting will deal with preparing the home for emergency, the regular and emergency set-up of the local fire department.
