They will arrange their display in the Cranbrook museum by the exhibition of North American basketry.

Achievements: Night, about May 1, at the conclusion of the course, will consist of the opening of the hall to the public. It will remain open to visitors throughout the summer.

The course will begin Saturday, Feb. 14, and continue each Saturday morning through April 25 excepting March 14 and 21. Sessions will begin at 9:00 and end at 11:30.

The course is open to qualified junior members of the Cranbrook Institute of Science who have completed the seventh grade and are under eighteen years of age. The size of the class is limited. Registration for the course as well as information regarding junior membership may be had by telephoning or calling at the Institute during business hours. Registration closes Tuesday, Feb. 10.
