It has just been announced from Boston that "The relief work carried on by the Christian Science War Relief Committee is to be continued for people abroad regardless of the entry of the United States into the war, and the Committee is prepared to extend its work to provide immediately for any possible need in this country or its possessions."

In accordance with the above announcement the local group is increasing its efforts to supply knitted garments and other articles. The need in Britain is increasing, especially for growing children. The group is also being urged to send clothing with which many persons
