

East Michigan Music Festival Coming Feb. 21

For the first time in the history of the Southeastern Michigan solo and ensemble festival will be held in Birmingham all day Saturday, Feb. 21, at Baldwin and Hill schools.

The festival will consist of solos in woodwind, brass and stringed instruments. There will also be twirling by drum majors.

To participate in this event a student must be enrolled in the music department of one of the schools in the Southeastern Michigan Band and Orchestra Association.

The participants will be judged on how nearly they attain perfection in the opinion of the judges, not in competition with each other. They will be rated superior, excellent, good, average, or poor.

Students will come from Walled Lake, Oxford, Grosse Pointe, River Rouge, Hamtramck, Plymouth, Pontiac, Wyandotte, Wayne, Rochester, Bergley, Ann Arbor, Lake Orion, Mount Clemens, Ecorse, Dearborn, Highland Park, and Birmingham schools.

The judges for the various solos or ensembles will be Roy Miller, assistant band director of Wayne University, for woodwind instruments; Graham Overgard, director of Wayne University band, for brass instruments; Russ Howland, University of Michigan, wind ensemble; W. P. Coles, professor of music at Wayne University, for piano solo; and Anthony Whitmer, of the music department of University of Michigan, will judge stringed instruments; Major Foster, Detroit, will judge twirling by drum majors; Homer LaGassey, Detroit, will judge piano solos.

There will be no charge for the festival and the public is invited to attend.

Recreation League To Help Soldiers
