

### Less Equipment, But Railroads Are Moving the Freight

The railroads of America are ready and able to meet the transportation demands placed upon them by the industrial, military and civilian needs in these times of defense activity; both the railroads and the federal government are wishing to avoid mistakes of World War No. 1, are working closely together to the end that plans of both will fit together satisfactorily.

In brief, this is what Birmingham Rotarians heard Monday noon by Booth H. Allen, public relations director of the Michigan Railroads Association. Mr. Allen, who moved into his new home on Northaven in Birmingham six months ago, was introduced by Rotarian Elmer W. Haack.

"Our nation's railroads today are ready for any emergency forceable at the moment," declared Mr. Allen. In the first World War many transportation problems were caused by confusion within government, largely due to the lack of experience of minor military officials in the federal service. Many of the mistakes may be classed as pardonable, since the government had no precedent to follow in such emergencies. But today government recognizes that it is better able to conduct the nation's transportation affairs and can safely assume that in this war government will not again buckle over the railroad systems of the country.

Mr. Allen pointed out that since 1918, America's railroads have spent over ten billions of dollars on equipment, including re-building of trackways, today and we can transport an average of 62 million tons in the first 100 miles of the route.
