nation of the whole science of magne-tism as we know it today. Queen Eliza-beth and her Court were so interested in his demonstrations that he was granted a pension of £100 a year to further his studies.

Gilbert took up the study of amber, and showed that its power of attraction was common to many other materials: class, resin, sulphur, rock crystd, sapphire, diamond. These substances he called "electrics" He also showed that the earth itself is a giant mignet, and that this earth itself is a giant mignet, and that this explained the behaviour of the magnetie compass. He used a sphere of lode-squeet idemonstrate the earth's magnetism. He also devised the "versorium," a light heedle or poinfer mounted on a pivot for detecting electric charges. The Great Fire of 1666 desgreyed nearly all of Gilbert's instruments.
