Complexity Of Flag Etiquette Found When Library Board Buys New Colors

Outside of Baldwin Public Library there is a new 50 foot flag pole, while inside there is a new silk flag and standard for the auditorium. All of this flag activity resulted when the Birmingham Woman's Club, which meets in the library, decided to open its meetings with a pledge of allegiance, and that the institution of flag had but one very old flag which evidently had never been used in the new building. The library board immediately appointed a committee headed by Mrs. Lee A. White, to attend to the purchasing of a flag. Emily Post has nothing on the people that make up flag etiquette. Mrs. White commented this week. It seems that anything but a flag atop an inside flag pole frowned upon—so Baldwin Public Library's new standard is graced with an eagle. "The size of the flag," Mrs. White explained, "is dictated by the height of the ceiling, ours is exactly right in being four by six feet. Fringe is out; it is no longer considered good form to have a fringed flag—but a silk cord is permitted. This cord, however, must not be tied to the pole itself as in the past, but should be slipped through a ring just below the eagle and then knotted."

Old custom has it that the flag in an auditorium should always stand on the right of the speaker and the left of an audience. Also, an outdoor flag pole should always be placed on the right of the main entrance. Height of an outdoor pole, such as the new one at the library, is dictated by the size and height of the trees and buildings—and the new outdoor flag, when it arrives, will be 6 by 10.

Coal Men Would Stop Natural Gas

A suit has been filed in Circuit Court which would prevent the new natural gas pipe line from the South from coming into this area. (It would end at the Consumers Power plant near the south-east corner of Birmingham, coming in on the 14-Mile road.) Plaintiffs in the suit are the Michigan Retail Coal Merchants, Albert C. Dunham, Royal Oak, and Carl H. Schumacher, of Ferndale, and the defendants are the Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Company and Consumers Power Company. The coal men are basing their suit on the allegation that because the pipe line company will not lay pipes across public highway right-of-way. A hearing on an order to show cause why a temporary injunction should not be issued is to be held before Judge H. Russell, Holland, but on Tuesday of this week, no precept had been filed to start the hearing machinery. Whether the litigation will delay construction of the pipeline is not yet known.
