Mothers Ask Free Transportation, Laundry for Sons

First district and state meeting of the infant organization, MOMS Club, Michigan, was held in Birmingham at the Community House last night Tuesday, June 30. State officers were elected and speakers of the day were Donald Schram, state editor of the Detroit Free Press, and Dr. W. Glen Harris.

Representatives were present from all eight of the existing MOMS Clubs—Pontiac, Dearborn, Holly, Royal Oak, Clawson, Detroit, Wayne and Birmingham. Mrs. Elmer Chaffee, of Dearborn, who organized the first club, was elected president of the state organization on Tuesday.

The state officers named include Mrs. H. W. Parsons, of Pontiac, vice president; Mrs. Charles Fortson, Birmingham, recording secretary; Mrs. Eleanor Phelps, Dearborn, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Mae Mason, of Pontiac, financial secretary; and Mrs. H. H. Gardner, Birmingham, treasurer. These officers, with Mrs. Norman Lytle as chairman, will form a committee to draw up state by-laws for the organization.

Getting right into the swing of things, these mothers of men in service passed the following resolutions: That the organization is to be non-partisan, non-sectarian and non-political; That the club petition the government for men in service; That MOMS petition the government for free transportation for men on furlough; That MOMS request the four national broadcasting stations to provide radio to send messages to sons overseas; That a telegram be sent to President Roosevelt.

Dr. W. Glen Harris spoke following the morning business session. He told the MOMS of his experience in Texas, during a 6,000-mile trip to nearly 20 army camps in no way destroy Christianity, for Christianity has been through many struggles—but it has never made it hard for us to be Christians," Dr. Harris said.

"Because our sons need to be reassured that we at home really care, we must write cheerful, natural letters and write them often. If we do not get prompt replies," he urged, "keep on writing anyway. Such groups as MOMS, he concluded, "can win this conflict simply by letting the boys know that we are behind them all the way."

Donald Schram, of the Free Press, explained the censorship of news, saying that when a war story comes in from one side of the conflict, the papers wait for the story from the other side and then put them together so that they feel it as near the truth as possible.

Mrs. Ralph C. Hoofnagle was in charge of the luncheon, decorative theme of which was along the patriotic lines for small flags and bouquets of red, white, and blue flowers decorated the table. Following the luncheon a musical program was put on under the direction of Mrs. H. H. Gardner.

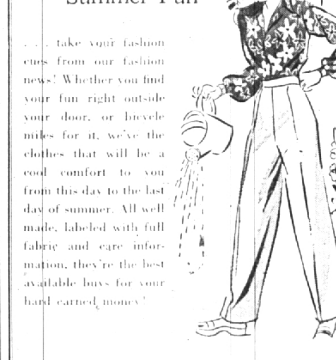
