

Summer Institute of War Work at Kingswood School to Close on Friday

Total Enrollment More Than 200 for Six Week Period

The final week of the Summer Institute at Kingswood School, Bloomfield Hills, is drawing to a close. Classes, last of which are being held Friday, have been enthusiastically attended during the six week term with a total enrollment of over 200 students.

In addition to a full schedule of Red Cross classes, with attendance reaching 161, there were 63 registrations in typing, shorthand, cooking, sewing, and weaving. Typing and cooking were particularly popular among all ages of students at the summer session.

In connection with the Red Cross program, on July 13, the Blood Donor Service converted two of the larger school rooms for their use and received a total of 98 donations during the day.

Unique in this part of the United States, the Summer Institute was new this year, having been organized to put equipment and training, difficult to obtain during war time at the disposal of the public. The attendance in all courses would indicate that the class has met with sincere approval.
