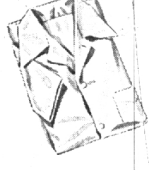

MRS. MILTON F. COULSON will entertain her bridge club next Wednesday afternoon in her home on Berwyn road.

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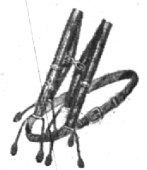
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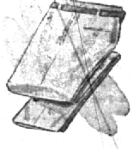
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
