MULCH In our discussion of cultivation we have spoken of a "mulch" and since we have been asked, exactly what is a mulch? The most ordinary use of the word is for the covering used to protect plants from alternate freezing and thawing in the winter. If this mulch were manure it would add fertility to the soil and also be turned under, come spring.

At the moment we are more interested in the summer mulch, which is meant to protect the roots from the heat and to allow the moisture to stay in the ground. We have seen how the stirring of the top soil provides a dust mulch. Another more extravagant plan is to have a mulch or covering of an inch of peat or leafmold—this is used especially in the perennial garden. Under bush fruits, a mulch of lawn clippings or straw manure will save time. Recently a mulch paper has appeared on the market, although it has not been used to a great extent.

BEETS Beets are among the foods which only home gardeners can enjoy at their peak of tenderness and flavor. Freshly picked beets are among the richest of vegetable in sugar content and are in sweetest form when they are pulled, when the roots are in milk. Cook in half an hour for supreme quality.
