### Tennis and Golf Letters Awarded

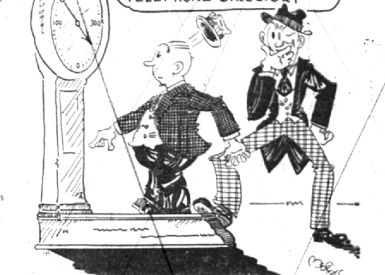
Four letters were awarded to members of the 1942 Birmingham tennis team, which wound up the season with two triumphs against Eastbrook and Newcomb.
