When she entered the Spartan School of Aeronautics in Tulsa, Okla., five months ago, to study the complicated Sperry gyroscopic precision instruments, a laboratory study tackled by a mere handful of women scattered throughout the United States, men students did not make her task easier. She lifted heavy lathes which she needed, she worked stood for hours in the laboratory, and in general, did the same work as her male colleagues. There were five other coeds in the school and you can be sure it took them several weeks of apt and exacting work to prove to the 64 men students that they were capable of doing the laboratory technique requirements, which consisted of tearing down every type of aircraft instrument, cleaning them and then putting them working order again. In other words, each student really knew what made an aeronautical instrument "tick" before he or she could claim a diploma from the school. Miss Alexander was graduated from the Spartan School on June 2.

Sour Cream is an asset to the cook who knows how to use it. Many delicious dishes can be made with it.

Creamed Fish a la Geanette
Cover the bottom of a baking dish with a layer of thinly sliced boiled potatoes, then lay in pieces of boiled fish, about 2 pounds. Make a cream sauce of 3 tablespoons butter and 1 1/2 cups of milk. When sauce begins to thicken, add salt, pepper and the juice of a whole lemon. Let it boil a few minutes. When ready, add 1/2 cup sour cream. Pour this sauce over the fish, spread on top some Parmesan cheese or other grated cheese. Cook in the oven about 10 minutes.

Cucumbers With Sour Cream
2 medium cucumbers
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 cup thick sour cream
2 tablespoons white vinegar
1 tablespoon minced onion
Pinch of sugar.

Beets a la Russe
8 to 10 beets
1 teaspoon flour
1 tablespoon butter
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup sour cream
Pepper.

Roast Chicken With Sour Cream
1 roasting chicken
1 cup of sour cream
Salt.

Spaghetti With Sour Cream
8 minute package spaghetti.
1 1/2 cups canned tomatoes.
1/2 cup sour cream.
1/2 teaspoon sugar.
1 teaspoon salt.

Sauce With Sour Cream
No. 1
2 tablespoons butter.
2 tablespoons flour.
1 cup sour cream.

2,160 Trained Pilots Ready in Michigan

LANSING—As American pilots and planes are blasting a wide swath in Japanese invasion areas in the Far Pacific and on Nazi-dominated European territory, a civilian air force is ready in the event of an emergency at home to go into action along with millions of trained civilian defense workers in city and country.

In Michigan alone, more than 2,160 trained pilots of the Civil Air Patrol are prepared to resist air attack, land invasion, sabotage, or other enemy action, according to S. B. Steers, chairman of the aviation committee of the Michigan Council of Defense and Commander of the Michigan Wing of the CAP.
