

### Yellowed Pages of London Times Tell of Napoleon's Final Defeat

A copy of the London Times, dated June 22, 1815, and a copy of the London Morning Advertiser, Feb. 8, 1794, are two interesting possessions of George W. Heath, 515 Aspen road.

The Times is historically important because it told of the defeat of Napoleon at Waterloo, but the yellowed and frayed pages of the journal confirmed the story of that world-shaking event to the inside pages. Page One is devoted almost entirely to advertising matter, much in the same style as many modern English papers, but in the lower right corner, without benefit of any heading in larger type, is a story:

"We have seen a gentleman who left Brussels on Monday evening, at which time the people were manifesting the greatest joy for a decisive victory gained by the Duke of Wellington on that day. The wounded were beginning to be brought in, in wagons."

The Story Inside  
However, on the inside of the four-page paper is a complete account of the battle, written by Field Marshal the Duke of Wellington, in a report to "his most porters of the field of battle."

The report of the light of Wellington begins with the plans for battle, and does not tell in the

opened it was not until our own Civil War some 50 years later that the newspaper lead paragraph came into being. The duke went on at great length and concluded with an account of how the Prussian Marshal Blucher helped turn the tide with a timely attack on the French flank.

The other paper, the Morning Advertiser, is of somewhat the same style and interesting in the manner in which it reveals the style of speech 150 years ago. This is one of the ads: "Wanted, some Capital hands in the stay and mantua-making line. Enquire at No. 2, Sackville-street, Piccadilly, from 8 to 10 at night."

The "capital hands" means first-class workers; the "stay" means corsets and "mantua" is an outer-cloak or mantle.

In an advertisement for a play, it states: "It is a privilege will be spoken by Mr. Barrymore, no doubt a forebear of the modern Barrymores."  
The Heath family came from England and has had the papers in its possession for many years.

J. E. Wilson Papers  
Another old paper of interest is that owned by J. E. Wilson, 478 Park street. It is a copy of the Democratic Free Press and Michigan Intelligencer, Volume 1, No. 1, the forerunner of the modern Free Press, and is dated May 5, 1831. The first issue is given over largely to politics of the Democratic Republicans, as the Democrats then were known. Under the masthead of the publisher, Sheldon McKnight, is a statement, "Andrew Jackson for President."

The paper of the Whigs, the Detroit Journal, was called a "radical" because it purported to be neutral.  
Mr. Wilson's paper is a facsimile, as the indistinct print in some lines shows. Papers in those days, like the smaller papers today, were printed directly from type and with excellent clarity. However, it is worth keeping although Mr. Wilson uses it occasionally.
