

Many Local Boys Will Attend Camp Of YMCA at Hale

Camp Mah-n-go-tah-see, the Oakland County Y.M.C.A. camp, is opening its 13th season in the beautiful and spacious site at Loom Lake, near Hale, Inoc County, Michigan, on Wednesday, July 1, with more than 90 boys in attendance, many from Birmingham.

This camp has built up an enviable reputation as one of the leading camps in the State. Many hundreds of boys have not only enjoyed a rich camping experience here, but have also learned many useful skills such as swimming, canoeing, archery, fishing, sailing, boating, nature lore, outdoor cooking, woods lore, horseback riding, handicraft and others.

The happy freedom of camp life, the chance for initiative in planning and carrying out of programs, the opportunity of learning how to live comfortably in the open; the growth of personality in companionship with counselors and other boys; the freedom from tensions—all of these things tend to make camp one of the most important phases of education of a boy as he begins to rely upon himself more and more. The appreciation of God through the stars, in the beauty of nature, in participation in the camp worship service in the out-of-doors, in learning to appreciate the other fellow's rights, in companionship with other boys, in the simple courtesies of everyday camp life—all of these make a lasting impression upon the lives of the boys.

The leadership of Mah-n-go-tah-see will be headed by such men as Robert D. Lynd, Y.M.C.A. secretary, director for the eleventh season; E. A. (Gene) Hubbard, teacher in Birmingham High School, Program Director and in this camp for ten seasons; Miles W. Robinson, principal of Barnum Junior High School, director of aquatics for the third season; John Baldwin, director of physical education, Royal Oak High School, will direct the camp worship service; and Arthur E. Moore, judge of football, will be in charge of the football team.
