Conservation of materials and manpower make it necessary to change certain operating methods, including meter reading. Beginning in June, meters will be read every two months, instead of monthly. This applies to residential meters and certain commercial meters. It does not apply generally to industrial customers.

The plan will be started on June 1, 1942, and the new scheduling of meter reading provides for one-half of the meters to be read in June, and the balance in July, and thereafter bimonthly.

BILL EACH MONTH

- If your meter is read in June, your bill will cover one month's metered consumption as heretofore.
- If your meter is not read during the month of June, your bill will, under ordinary conditions, be one-half the bill computed for the previous two months.
- Starting with July, in those months during which meters are read, (which reading will be for a two months' period) the several blocks of the rate schedule will be applied on a two months' basis. To arrive at the amount of the bill for this one month, the amount billed for the previous month is deducted. The balance is then the bill for the month. (This will be shown on your bill.) Thus the bill will be automatically adjusted every other month.
