

Loss to Royal Oak Ends Track Season

The Birmingham track team completed its 1942 outdoor season, one of the most successful ever enjoyed here, Tuesday afternoon, at Cass Field, dropping a triangular meet to Royal Oak, 41% to 51%. Ferndale was third with 32% points.
Ending his high school track career, Captain Jack Steelman, Birmingham, won the 100-yard dash in 10.2 seconds, tying the Cass Field record, and ran a leg on the winning relay team with Sterling, Peterson, and Murray. Steelman remained undefeated in the 220 all season.
Zoellin, the Maples' ace vaulter, reached 10 feet 9 inches to top the event. Charleston, Birmingham, tied with three others for third and fourth.
Husky Bruce Flu of the Aeches put the shot 45 feet 10 inches, beating Don Fisher, Birmingham, by three inches. This was Fisher's second setback of the year. Blau-man of the Maroons received fourth.
The local lads wound up the season with two dual victories, two triangular triumphs and one defeat, dropping the TVAA meet by one-half point, as well as winning the class B state championship, Wayne Relays, and the Regional meet.
School records were broken in the meet. (See Sports Showup.)
