Southfield Air Raid Classes Started

Southfield Township Civilian Defense Council, Lee B. Durham, Chairman, has completed its organization against air raids and the township has been zoned into ten strategic districts to coordinate air raid, fire, and police protection for its 12,000 residents, chief air raid warden of the township.

Children's Aid Society Seeks Homes Here

The Michigan Children's Aid Society is attempting to locate boarding homes for children in the Birmingham area, according to Miss Orrel Erdman, executive secretary of the Pontiac branch. The society takes children without homes and those not receiving proper care in their present surroundings and houses them out with private families.

A nominal fee is paid the family to care for the children, room and board.

All of the children, who range from six weeks old to high school age, are mentally and physically all right.
