The new seeds of the tender vegetables—beans, corn and tomatoes. Set out plants of cabbage, tomato, eggplant and peppers. Should there be an unexpected late frost thereafter, plants may be protected with paper or stings.

Leave sufficient room between plants and thin seedlings already in the row. Nothing is gained by trying to force more plants in. Weed, cultivate and spray as needed from the start.

PLANTING
The following divisions of the Michigan Council of Defense is the best transplanting time when it is cool and cloudy or when the sun is high. The best time of day to transplant, after 4 p. m. when the moisture in the air is increasing and the plants face the cooler night air in which to recover before being subjected to the hot sun.

Don't be stingy; dig hole large enough to spread out the roots, and then firm the soil, so that contact is close, since without this contact the roots cannot absorb water from the soil. Seedlings should usually be set a little deeper than they stood in the flat box. In the case of overgrown plants, it may be better to plant horizontally under the soil for several inches, rather than let them stand upright. This is especially the case with tomatoes.

The soil should be soaked after the transplanting operation is finished.
