Books Are Valuable Information Sources For People at War

"Books and Tidal Victory" was the subject of the eight and final lecture by Olive Deane Hornell in the University of Michigan extension series on "The New Books and Plays," which was given Monday afternoon at the Baldwin Public Library. The series was sponsored here by St. Catherine's Guild.

"All intelligent persons realize that total victory can never be achieved by tanks and guns alone," Miss Hornell said, "essential as these weapons are to our success. Total victory will be the result of intelligent understanding of the problems involved and of creative thinking toward the end in view by as many as possible of our individual citizens. Books are that unrivaled means to this end."

Miss Hornell presented a comprehensive list of important books of a kind never before available to a people in time of war, covering effectively every phase of the war problem and the war program from the home front to the world front. She cited America Organizes to Win the War, "Women for Defense" by Margaret Culkin Banning, "Education for Death" by Gregor Ziemer, "America in the New Pacific" by George E. Taylor, "Dawn of Victory" by Louise Fischer, and "The Crisis of Our Age" by Pitirim Sorokin.
