Players Will Have Hills Garden Club Picnic on Saturday Plans Pilgrimages For Monday, June 1

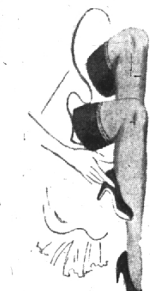

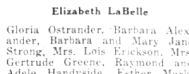

The program will include tap, toe, tap, toe, Spanish, tap, aerobic, modernistic tap and eccentric dancing. The public is cordially invited to attend.

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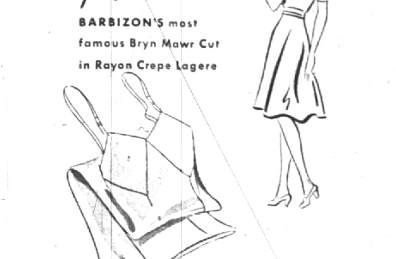
