Four runs were scored on Paul Kelley before he left the box in the third, and four more were scored on Larry Mintling who relieved him.

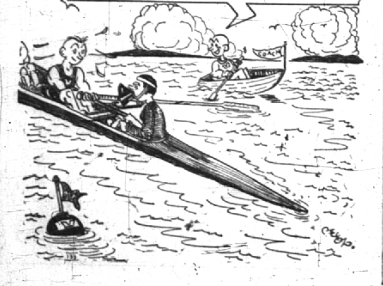
