Mme. N. Magidoff, Recently in Russia, To Address Group

The annual reunion meeting of Mrs. Charles J. Shan's International Relations Class will be held Friday morning, May 8, featuring Mme. N. Magidoff, wife of the Associated Press correspondent, Robert Magidoff, who has covered Russia for the past six years.

The meeting will be held at 10 a. m. and also has the joint support of the League of Women Voters and the American Association of University Women's branch here. Any interested persons are invited to attend.

Mme. Magidoff is in Detroit on behalf of the Russian War Relief Campaign and is speaking over WJZ Friday night at 8 p. m. and at 9:30 p. m. May 9 in Don Polski hall at a meeting of the Russian section.

Mme. Magidoff herself saw and took active part in the great Russian stand against the Nazi invasion. She will tell about her experiences—including wading a gauntlet along with other women's barricades were thrown up last summer and fall around Moscow.

In a letter to the Detroit Committee for Russian War Relief, Mme. Magidoff said that long before the Germans attacked Moscow, the Russians prepared for the air invasion from the air. She also said that the morale of the Russians was unusually high, and that they are convinced they will win.
