What happens in an English private school when three beautiful young girls descend into its cloistered midst is the theme of Ian Hay's play "Housemaster" which has been selected as the Christmas show of Cranbrook's Eggesterton Club. Sara Weeks of Boston, Nancy Sanders of Bloomfield Hills, and Anne Ballentine of Birmingham, are the three young ladies who cause all the trouble, and they are under the guidance of Pat Newhall, an adult housewife of Birmingham. The dormitory under the watchful eye of Tom Turker, who plays the title role, is thrown into a complete frenzy. A marriage and one engagement receive a complete reversal of fortune. "Housemaster" is not a farce, it is a sentimental comedy, so well written that the humor comes out of human nature.
