Altogether, it is something of a feeble utterance by one of the chiefs of Hitler's New Order. Despite all that the German Army has accomplished, the second Nazi admits that Europe will be without adequate food this Winter, that the war in Russia will continue into 1943, and that there is no defense to protect German cities and industrial cities from Anglo-American bombing.
