On the next play Thurston scored easily and a pass from Austerlione to Schaefer provided the extra point. The game ended shortly after with the final score, 13-7 for the locals.

Exhibiting Works of John Cornish, Former Baldwin Art Teacher

The Baldwin art classes are now exhibiting in Hill school gallery some of the popular works of John Cornish, former art teacher here. One of the unusual aspects of his work is that some of his products are done in gesso. This is an old method used by some of the masters, and Mr. Cornish has revived it and is experimenting with it.

Gesso is a combination of plaster of Paris, glue and varnish, cooked until doughy, then spread on layer after layer, until a hard surface is formed; this takes the place of the artist's canvass.

Landscapes were predominant in the collection and ranged from snow to rural pictures. Those of which were pleasing were done almost entirely in brown and green tones.
