A letter was received by the City Commission Monday night from James A. Evans of the Universal Blower Co. He said that as long as the City had made no move to pave the short stretch of East Lincoln between Adams and Woodward, there was no point in his continuing to pay \$42.11 a year for five years as his share of a special assessment.

City Manager Egbert said that he believed the project could still go through if the property owners pay enough cash to start. The City is paying 70 per cent of the expense. Further, the City Charter prohibits the Commission from receding a project once started.
