

City-Wide Junior Defense Council Sponsors Salvage Drive Starting Monday

First Meeting Held On Monday Night; Wright President

Election of officers and plans for the scrap metal drive were the main discussion points in the City-Wide Junior Defense Council's first meeting, held Monday night at the Hill School.

Officers named: Wright, president; Gordon Cole, vice president; Beverly Johnston, secretary; Dick Austin, treasurer. John H. Harwood, managing editor of The Eccentric and city salvage chairman, gave a talk on the scrap metal drive which is to be held Oct. 6-17. In this drive the schools will be put into competition against each other. The school which gets the most scrap per capita will receive as a prize the old Confederate cannon on the Hill School grounds. The proceeds from this will be added to those of other scrap metal sold.

Jan Blinn, Ann Sears, and Winford Johnston were appointed as a publicity committee for the drive. Problems and precautions of all raids were also discussed, and it was suggested that every school be supplied with posters directing students where to go in case of all raids.

Will Place Signs: Horton Cole and Tom Milbrant were appointed to take care of the signs. The Junior Defense Council includes two representatives from each junior and senior high school class, two representatives at large from each elementary school, and two members from Holy Name School, besides principals from the different schools and Dr. D. B. Ireland, superintendent of schools. In addition to this central body, each school has its own separately functioning council.

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Football Team Faces Dearborn in Next Tilt

With one victory under its belt—a 13-0 win over Melvindale—Dearborn's football eleven has hopes of giving Birmingham a tough battle in their game Friday afternoon at 3:30 at Dearborn. Coach Jack Rabe says that he

Coach Rabe gave the following tentative line-up for Friday's encounter: left end, Vicary; left tackle, Pearce; left guard, Hubbard; center, Linton; right guard, Clements; right tackle, either Woods or Shaw; right end, Wisco; quarterback, Gregory; tailback, Walsh; left half, Wagner; and fullback, Myszkowski. The team has a number of substitutes. The Birmingham lineup has not been finally decided upon by Coach George Warner, but probably will be much the same as that which took the field against East Detroit.

Neither coach was willing to make any pre-game predictions, but he expects a tough battle. Last year Dearborn finished in a three-way tie with Plymouth and Birmingham for the Twin Valley League championship. The popular sport of cross country is drawing quite a following at Baldwin, with 30 candidates trying out for the seven places on the squad. Let-terners back are Frank Wangberg, Jack Hippie, Dick Morrison, Bob Moody and Fred Zollner. The work of Wangberg in practice has been particularly impressive. This boy deserves a lot of credit. During the last three weeks of summer vacation, Frank took daily runs around Pierce Field. This sort of perseverance pays, not only now but in track next spring.

Because of the national request asking students not to attend out-of-town games, Birmingham stands looked quite bare at East Detroit except for several faithful parents and out-of-school rooters. The ruling was made to conserve tires. This is just one of the sacrifices that all of us must expect to make. Nearly all students cooperated and remained at home. Evidently the boys knew their faithful backers were with them in spirit and so delivered a smashing win.

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New Girls' League For Baldwin High Will Be Organized

By CONSTANCE COULTER The first meeting of Baldwin's new girls' League will be held after school tonight to plan the organization of the group and to elect officers. The league was started by Mrs. Carol Darling, dean of girls, and is open to every high school girl. Its purposes are to promote a friendly, democratic spirit among all Baldwin girls and to distribute widely opportunities for responsible leadership. It will attempt to coordinate all girls' activities, to build a fine morale, and to render assistance to the school, community, and government.

Officers to be filled: To encourage an active start, many tentative plans have been made, including the establishment of a girls' club, a girls' organization. At the opening meeting, a president, five vice-presidents, and a secretary will be elected. To serve as chairman of five major committees: program, service, finance, social, and legislative. Once the league is organized, the legislative committee will draw up a constitution and submit it for approval to the school officials.

Suggestions for possible programs include open house nights at which the girls will entertain the boys; orientation programs for new students; a Valentine tea; a Mothers' Day party; an all-girl assembly; personality programs with outside speakers; a vocational and health assistance program; and various projects such as Christmas boxes for soldiers, aid to hospitals, and food for needy families.

Financial Plans: To gain a financial foothold, the girls' League has been granted the concession to open a school supplies store in the building. Other money-making ventures may include a tutoring department, charging a small fee for the return of lost articles, and a hake sale at one of the P.T.A. meetings.

There will also be an athletic committee to cooperate with the girls' athletic department. Mrs. Darling hopes that the girls' League and Recreation Club may eventually associate itself with the league. Other activities may include a tutoring department, various contacts with the faculty, and a file of record cards showing activities of every girl has done in school activities.

Baldwin Organizes Jr. Defense Council

For the second year Baldwin has organized a Junior Defense Council. This time under the direction of W. S. Toothaker, physics instructor. Gordon Cole, last year's chairman, was elected to fill that office again and Amy Roosevelt was named secretary and treasurer at the first meeting last week. Charles Conwell and Ann Halliday were appointed to represent Baldwin on the City-Wide Junior Defense Council, which has members from all schools.

A scrap metal drive in the nature of a contest is the Council's main project at present. Roy Olsen is chairman of the campaign. Other committee heads are Mary Henderson, in charge of placing students for air raid drills; and Charles Conwell, who will be responsible for sandbag protection. The council will have the candy-selling concession at all home football games. Each home room in Baldwin sent three representatives to the meeting.
