## Dislikes Treasury's Sales Arguments

Editor, The Eccentric:  
Thoughtful citizens are viewing with serious misgivings the sales tactics being employed by our Treasury in its radio campaign to sell war bonds. The success of that campaign is important to all of us but does that fact justify a sales appeal based upon untruths?  
Day after day and many times each day the American public is being told that the purchase of war bonds will directly contribute to the defeat of Hiroto and Hitler. We are even told in vivid terms, that if we do not buy enough bonds our soldiers at the front may, as a direct consequence, fail to receive vitally needed munitions. These statements are simply not true. This country is going to exert the maximum military effort by which it is capable, and it will produce all of the weapons and munitions it needs, irrespective of whether or not war bonds are sold or not. How we finance this war will affect our civilian economy tremendously, but our war effort not at all. That will go on regardless. There is a compelling reason why we should all buy bonds to the limit of our ability—for otherwise we may have ruinous inflation—that the economy being broadcast by the Treasury are inflated puff.

Why should the government of a great nation, in order to sell its bonds, choose to deceive its citizens by a false appeal when an honest appeal could just as well have been made? Do our Treasury officials believe that the public is "too dumb" to distinguish fiction from fact, and too unthinking to respond to a purely logical appeal even to its own self interest? ## Eye Curie to Speak On Fisher Program

Eye Curie, distinguished daughter of a famous mother, will speak at Detroit Town Hall at the Fisher Theatre, Wednesday morning, Oct. 22.

Noted for the brilliantly written biography of Madame Curie, dis-

cover of radium, Mme. Curie has become, since the fall of France, a leading war correspondent and recently returned from a tour around the world visiting combat zones in Europe and the Far East. In her lecture at Town Hall, "Liberty vs. Oppression?" the author will report on international developments as she observed them first hand.
