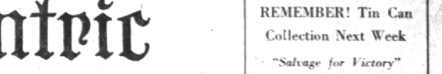

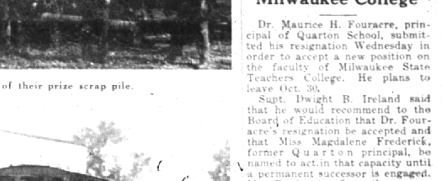

This ancient steam engine, pulling a big trailer, collected scrap from merchants last Wednesday. Dwight Baldwin owns the engine.



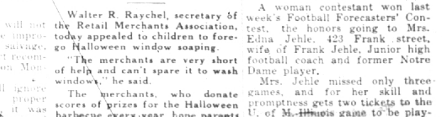
