Rep. Dondero's office submitted the following statement:

"Rep. George A. Dondero, who has represented the 17th Congressional District of Michigan since its creation in 1932, and who is a candidate for reelection on the Republican ticket, was born Dec. 10, 1887, on a farm in Greenfield township, Wayne county, Michigan.

"In the campaign of 1940, Rep. Dondero promised the people of the district that he would exert every effort to keep the nation out of another foreign war and he has no apology to make for having kept that promise.

For National Unity

"When we were attacked by a treacherous foe, our new situation demanded a complete abandonment of political differences, in order to erect a united front. Any deviation from this path in this hour of national peril strikes at unity and serves no patriotic purpose.

"Rep. Dondero has voted for every measure to support the vigorous prosecution of the war and will continue to do so. This is but one task before us today and that is the summing of our minds and to that end Rep. Dondero pledges his all-out effort. His services to Congress have been of continuous effort, but he can only represent the people of the district.

"Rep. Dondero voted for the lowering of the draft age, basing his decision upon the insistence of the War Department that such a move was necessary to win the war, but took the initiative in compelling the War Department to accept old youths by being no less than one year of training before being sent overseas for combat duty. This provision, however, was voted down by the majority in Congress.

"When the recent Price Control Act amendments were before the House, Rep. Dondero voted for the inclusion of labor costs in determining farm prices in order that the farmer might be able to pay the labor costs of his long, hard hours of labor.

Opposes Pork Barrel
"Rep. Dondero is an influential member of the Committee on Rivers and Harbors and instrumental in securing passage of legislation for the immediate construction of an additional lock at the Soo and worked for improvement of rivers and harbors projects considered essential to our war program. At the same time he actively opposed the expenditure of money on 'pork barrel' projects.

"Rep. Dondero does not favor compulsory savings, unless it is clearly shown that such a step is necessary to carry on the war. All men must share in the sacrifices which will be involved in winning the war, but compulsion of our people must not be resorted to unless circumstances arise which dictate that such action must be taken to preserve the Republic.

College Develops A New Flower

Eight years of effort represent some of the background of a commercial flower newly released to Florists of Michigan.

The flower is a hybrid kalanche developed by C. E. Wilton, floriculturist of the Michigan State College horticulture department. The Michigan State kalanchoe is considered extremely desirable because it will produce good commercial quality blossoms during the cloudy months.

Brilliant blossoms are a feature of the new hybrid plant. The color is a near scarlet tinged with rose. The plant has less tendency to close its blossoms at night than the commercial quality blossoms of its parents, kalanchoe Blossfeldiana. The flower stalk is constructed similar to that of its other parent, kalanchoe pinnatifida.

To date Wilton has not obtained fertile seed from the new flowering plant, but he finds the kalanchoe Michigan State is easily propagated from single eye or leaf-cuttings taken after flowering.

In commercial production the floriculturist recommends cuttings made in March. Plants may be started by the florist from June to August, planted six to eight inches apart. At first a thorough watering is given the plants and no more moisture applied until the soil becomes thoroughly dry. After August one or two waterings are recommended until flowering. Blossoms, Wilton reports, are lasting when cut and are useful in arrangements and designs as well as for corsages.

TELEPHONES ... IN AIR RAID PROTECTION
If enemy bombers ever come roaring in at five miles a minute—split-second will count. Fast communication is vital. The telephone has six important functions in Civilian Defense against air raids:
1. Receiving warnings. If enemy aircraft are detected by the Army's "spotter" planes, the telephone is used to call the telephone to control centers in towns that are threatened.
2. Collecting workers. Key men in Civilian Defense units are notified at once by telephone so that when the sirens sound they will be ready to direct the workers in their organizations.
3. Reporting bomb damage. If a raid is made, telephone quickly reports complete information to the local control center about bomb damage.
4. Sending men to handle damage. Depending on the nature of the damage, rescue squads, demolition squads or other units are dispatched by telephone to deal with it.
5. Contact between units and headquarters. After squads reach their bombing areas, they use the telephone to report the progress of their work to the control center.
6. Exchanging help. If the situation appears to be getting out of control of the local units, requests for help are telephoned to other control centers by commanding officials.
The telephone system affects the safety of all of us. That's why it is vitally important that you do not telephone during or for some time after an air raid alarm, except in cases of extreme urgency. The lines must be kept clear to handle the calls that guard your life and your home.
