Program Revealed for Home Nursing Institute

The special home nursing institute scheduled for next week, Sept. 15, 16, and 17, at the Horace H. Rackham Building, Detroit, promises to be most interesting. Sponsored by the Oakland County Red Cross unit, this institute will point out newest trends in health work, with special emphasis on wartime community problems.

Included among the speakers will be Lt. Col. Harold A. Furlong, M.C.E.S.A. Administrator, Michigan Council of Defense; Captain Lucas, Chief of the Orthopedic Service, Selfridge Field; and Robert W. Kelso, Ph.D., director, curriculum in social work, University of Michigan.

Sessions will last from 10 a. m. until 4 p. m., daily, with outstanding speakers on communicable disease, nutrition, maternal and infant care, sex education in the home, and demonstrations of the use of improvised materials.

Mrs. Hugh Little, R. N., chairman, for nursing work, will preside over the institute, while

the entire program is under the supervision of Mrs. Agnes Stahly, R. N., M.A., director of the Red Cross home nursing program.

Meetings are open to all nurses and teachers of Red Cross home nursing classes.

Primarily as a war-time service to the community, the University of Michigan Alumnae Club of Birmingham will sponsor the monthly course of lectures on "The New Books and Plays," given by Olive Deane Hormel, special lecturer for the University of Michigan Extension Service. Mrs. Robert F. Watt, president, announces lectures will be held at 1:30 o'clock the third Wednesday afternoon of each month at the Baldwin Public Library. The first will be on Oct. 21.

Books and Total Victory

Retitled for the duration, "Books and Total Victory," the popular course is a feature of the University of Michigan's non-student extension program. It is designed to serve men and women whose reading time is diminished as they become involved in war work, and is dedicated to making books more effective as weapons, for to quote Archibald MacLeish, "Books are the strongest and most enduring weapons in our fight to make the world a place in which the free can live in freedom."

Lecturers are planned to cover the various "fronts," ideological as well as geographical. Where controversial matters are handled, both sides of major issues will be summarized. This will be done with the idea that the people of democracy must learn to consider enemies uneducated if they are not familiar with the various aspects of such issues. Fewer books will be discussed than in former years, but these more fully. There will also be comment each month on the best "escape" literature.

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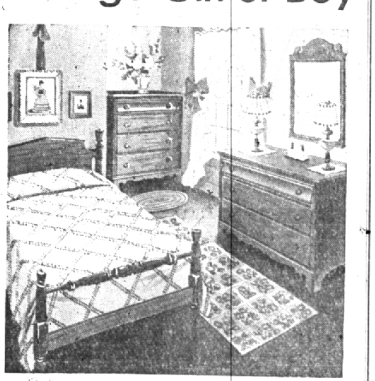
