Congress Aspirant

Outlines His Views
(Joseph F. Martin, of Walled Lake, Democratic candidate for Congress, has issued the following statement outlining his views.)

I am sorry to be so late in replying to your kind letter, but working every day in a war plant, and running a Congressional campaign at the same time, does have its complications.

I am chief assistant draftsman at the Kelsey-Hayes plant, and an active member of the Society of Designing Engineers, (I.O.), and in the past, have been a farmer, soldier, small business man and legislator.

I am in favor of total national planning, with equal authority allocated to farmers, labor, business and the public war agencies; and I believe, further, that such a procedure of national planning should be applied to the post-war effort, but to the post-war period, too; so that the full productive capacity of American industry and agriculture will be devoted to satisfying the needs of the people available to all.

I am for rigid price control and democratic rationing, during the war, to be applied rigorously, so that luxuries for the few will be prohibited, and the necessities of life made available to all.

I am for a democratic peace negotiated upon the Four Freedom platform in the Atlantic Charter.

Enlists Again

SELFRIDGE FIELD, Mich.—Another soldier of the famous American Volunteer Group, recently disbanded after making a brilliant record against the Japs in skies over China, has re-enlisted in the service of his country at Selfridge Field to join other comrades of the AVG.

Leaving behind in his home town of Midland, Mich., "a bit of an Irish lassie," his sweetheart, "The whole town is in a tizzy, so I won't give you her name," and receiving the grade of staff sergeant, Lt. Dan Kelly, age 28, is ready now to march on where he left off in his arduous activities in the far east last February.

Sgt. Hanley is the second American Volunteer Group soldier to enlist at this field. Technical Sergeant Ferris Newell enlisted here last month after a perilous journey from China. Equally dangerous was the trip of Sgt. give your electric washer this PREFERRED TREATMENT

To help your washer stand up under the big load it faces for the duration, keep in mind these few simple rules:

1. Drain washer and rinse tub thoroughly after each washing. Remove agitator or suction cups and rinse.
2. Wipe dry with a soft cloth to remove any soap scum or lint that may remain. If your washer has a spinner dryer, this too should be cleaned, rinsed and wiped dry.
3. Don't try to force thick, bulky articles through your wringer—and especially don't run through belt buckles or other hard objects that might cut the rolls. They are rubber, and precious!
4. Release the pressure on wringer when not in use. This saves the spring and the rubber, and prevents the roll from becoming flat on one side.
5. Don't overload your washer. Gramming in too big a wash simply puts a strain on the motor, and results in a less satisfactory job.
6. When you finish washing, dry the wringer thoroughly, also dry the connecting cord and wind it up carefully. Leave cover off washer to prevent it from becoming musty. The Detroit Edison Company.
