(Editor's Note—Herewith is the fourth article by the Rev. W. Glen Harris, Ph.D., containing reactions after six weeks spent with service men Texas.)

No single struggle in the history of the American Republic has so far demanded the all-out effort for success as the present effort to preserve democracy. The task is so great that average individuals are sometimes at a loss to know just where he can fit in to render the most effective service.

First: Let the boys in the armed service know that you really care. Send them such packages as the government permits. Send their clippings, interesting newspaper articles, and write often. If you have seen or immediately relative in the service adopt one or more, and write to him regularly.

Second: Buy bonds and maintain confidence in our government. Our government needs money. It needs your money, and let me say to you all the victor of our war, war bonds are as good as our government and our government is as good as our money.

Third: Let the boys in the armed service know that you really care. Send them such packages as the government permits. Send their clippings, interesting newspaper articles, and write often. If you have seen or immediately relative in the service adopt one or more, and write to him regularly.

Fourth: Refrain from loose talk. Avoid all unnecessary and unbecoming comments. During wartime rumors are deadly.
