2. Turn down the gas until the height of flame is approximately one inch.
3. Use care in adjusting water heater in the same manner.
4. IMPORTANT—Automatic and instantaneous water heaters and special appliances should not be used until our service men have made adjustments.

MAKE THIS SIMPLE ADJUSTMENT ON AIR SHUTTER OF GAS BURNERS (TWO ORDINARY MODELS SHOWN HERE)

Pictured at the left is the front view of one of the most common Gas Stove Burners in use today. It shows the approximate present adjustment of the air shutter. When screw is loosened, air shutter turns easily.

At the right we have this same burner showing an approximate adjustment of the air shutter for Natural Gas. Make this adjustment. Be sure to tighten screw when you have finished.

At the left we have another type of Gas Burner commonly used today showing the approximate present adjustment of the air shutter which you are now using for manufactured gas. When screw is loosened, air shutter may be turned easily.

Pictured at the right you see the air shutter opened to allow more air. When enough air has been added, flame will be blue. After making this adjustment, tighten screw.
