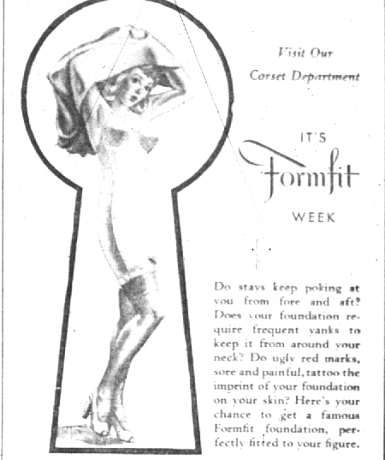

Tomatoes Simple Product to Can

One of the simplest of preserving jobs is the art of canning tomatoes or of making tomato juice, according to members of the home economics service at Michigan State College.

They recommend these standard practices for either of the jobs: For canning tomatoes, use firm, ripe tomatoes with no decayed spots. Wash the tomatoes, and cut in half to put them in a tray or wire basket and immerse for about a minute in boiling water, followed by a quick dip into cold water. Drain, peel and remove the cores.

Tomatoes cut into quarters should be heated to boiling, held until heated through. Pack boiling hot into sterilized jars, adding a teaspoon of salt to each quart. Fill to top with boiling juice, cover and process for five minutes.

In making tomato juice, many steps are similar. Work fast when you can tomato juice—this saves time. To insure speed, work with only enough tomato to make 1 to 2 gallons of juice at a time.

First, wash and trim the tomatoes. Do not have to remove the skins. To preserve the flavor and color, use stainless steel knives if possible. Avoid copper, brass, or iron utensils. Cut the tomatoes into small pieces. Then put them on the stove and simmer them until they are softened. Do not boil.

Put the hot tomatoes through a fine sieve—in order to remove the skins and seeds. Add from 1/2 to 1 teaspoon of salt to each quart of juice. However, omit the salt if you are on a diet or are on a saltless diet. Reheat the juice immediately. If you use glass containers, heat the jars, just to boiling, pour it into the sterilized jars or bottles, and seal them. No processing is necessary. Invert the jars while they are cooling space. Do not leave any head space when putting tomato juice in either glass jars or tin cans.
