

Offer Aid to Adults  
To Train Them for  
Work in Offices

Adult classes in stenography and related subjects are planned for Birmingham to help fill a shortage of personnel, it was announced Wednesday by L. H. Brakhaage, new coordinator of business practice and distributive education at Baldwin High School.

Brakhaage, two-thirds of whose salary comes from Federal and State funds under the George Deane Act, believes that there are many who had these courses in high school but need "brushing up" before they can fill a job.

He also invited merchants and professional people who want to employ part-time help to contact him. Under the new plan at the high school, students taking office practice and selling courses will work part-time to get the practical experience necessary to make them competent help.

Brakhaage expects to find jobs for students in the new course, and also may find after-school and Saturday work for other students who want to keep busy and help alleviate the present labor shortage. He will work in cooperation with Lloyd G. Chapman, guidance counselor at the high school, who in the past has operated a quasi-employment agency for students.

The new coordinator is now at work, his job being a year-around one, and students and employers may now call on him at the high school with their problems. To find whether he is in his office, people may phone him at 825.

A new course to be added this year in the high school will be typewriter operation.

Recipes for Your  
Books, Cooks!

Visitors to Old Mexico have found that their first taste of real Mexican cooking was one of the most thrilling treats of their trip. They have been enchanted by the exotic flavors of the native foods, using cooking secrets centuries old, going to their dishes.

Try these recipes and make delightful Mexican dishes to serve your families and friends.

Shrimp Louisiana

- 1 pint peeled shrimp
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon minced onion
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup cream mixed parsley
- 1/2 cup onion tomato catsup
- Cook onions in butter until soft, add shrimp broken in pieces and brown. Stir in flour, salt, chili powder, and then gradually add the milk and catsup. Simmer several minutes. Serve over hot rice.

Mexican Chicken

- 4 or 5 pound fowl
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 4 tablespoons fat
- 1 small onion chopped
- 1-2 cup chicken stock
- green onions minced
- 1 cup tomatoes
- Cut the fowl into pieces for cooking and rub with salt in a mixture of flour and chili powder. Cook onion in the hot fat until brown. Add the chicken and brown. Pour the liquid over the chicken and simmer 15 minutes. Remove cover, cover and add catsup and parsley. Steam several minutes. Serve over hot rice.

Hot Tamale Pie

- 2 cups cooked meat ground
- 1-2 cups gravy or meat stock
- 1/2 cup clove minced onion
- 4 ripe olives chopped
- 2 tablespoons raisins chopped
- 1/2 cup chili powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 qt. cooked mush, stiff
- Cook meat from a roast or steak. Mix with gravy, garlic, onion, salt, raisins and chili powder. Line the bottom and sides of a casserole with the mush. Pour in the meat mixture, and then put the mush on top in broken pieces. Bake from 20 to 30 minutes in an oven 450 degrees. Serve from casserole.

Mexican Boiled Dinner

- 1 No. 2 can plain chili con carne
- 4 small carrots quartered
- 9 small onions
- 4 small turnips quartered
- 1 small cauliflower
- Hacon drippings
- Cook vegetables in boiling salted water until tender. Season with bacon drippings or butter. Arrange each kind of vegetable in a circle or mound around center of platter. Heat the can of chili con carne and pour in the center. Garnish with quartered tomatoes and green pepper rings.

Peanut Cheese Salad

- 1 No. 1 can peas
- 1 can American cheese dried
- 1 small onion chopped
- 1 pint tomato catsup
- 1/2 cup chili powder
- 1/2 cup hot sauce
- 2 teaspoon chili powder
- Mayonnaise
- Turn peas from a can into a strainer and let stand until the juice has been drained. Mix all the ingredients together, adding additional seasonings to suit individual taste. Moisten with mayonnaise. Serve on well-chilled lettuce.

Barbecue Sauce

- 1/2 cup mild vinegar
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 cup chili powder
- Mix and boil 5 minutes. Pour over roast meat and baste often.

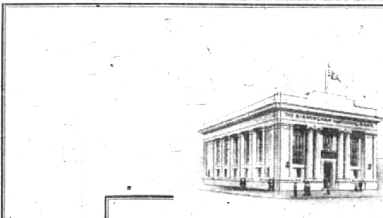
