Three In County Send Delegates To Meet Monday

The annual meeting of three Oakland County Red Cross Motor Corps units was held Monday evening in the Community House. Companies A of Pontiac, B of Birmingham and C of Southern Oakland County appeared in their formal uniforms. Each corps took its place behind its company guide in the main auditorium.

The stage was set with a large Red Cross banner below which hung three service flags representing husbands, sons, brothers, or daughters of Motor Corps members from these three units, serving in our armed forces. The silk flags were made by Mrs. John H. Grant, of Berkley, whose daughter is serving with the Red Cross Nurse Corps, flying with the southern unit of the Oakland County flag which was on the left.

On the platform sat Mrs. Sheldon R. Noble, chairman of Oakland County; Eula Stokely, administrator of volunteer services of the Midwestern area, from St. Louis; Ruth Kimball, executive secretary of the Oakland County Chapter; the Rev. Warner L. Forsyth, of Birmingham; Mrs. Earle Noble, of Pontiac, chairman of the county motor corps; Mrs. Hamilton H. Paterson, captain of the Birmingham unit; Mrs. B. C. Doying, captain of the southern Oakland County unit and Mrs. Mildred James, captain of the Pontiac unit.

Mrs. Kneale introduced Lt. Mungson of the Waacs who asked the Motor Corps' assistance in their present Oakland County recruiting drive.

Present also, in the audience was Lt. William Howard, who is in charge of all women and men drivers at the State Fair Grounds. Mrs. Noble spoke of the reasons for requiring every member's work in order to uphold the standards of the corps. She commended the group on its willingness to take orders and accept discipline.

Mrs. Noble introduced Miss Stokely who said that the Oakland County Chapter of the Red Cross is one of the outstanding chapters in the area.

Mrs. Noble introduced Mr. Forsyth who before his talk, dedicated the three service flags to the unit. Mr. Forsyth spoke of the pre-war "debunking" neo-intellectuals who believe that motorists should be stricken out. This, he said, almost led to disaster until Hartford awarded the commission and made us realize that we do live by ideals and heritages.

Mr. Forsyth stressed that all Red Cross volunteers should consider it a privilege, rather than a duty to serve, and they should do so "humbly, but proudly."

Captain Doying of Southern Oakland County presented an American flag, companion to the one already on the stage, made by Mrs. Grant, to the Birmingham unit, which was accepted by Capt. Paterson.
