

### Birmingham Makes Blood Bank Quota

At the Red Cross blood project on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, nearly 600 persons of this area donated their blood to meet the quota set. On Monday, 191 donors contributed and on Tuesday, 196. Wednesday's number was over 200 with some of them being turned away.

The Community House was unrecognizable in its medical trimmings. The American Red Cross blood donor unit from Detroit came and set up the hospital beds and equipment in the auditorium making it look like a miniature hospital.

Red Cross Nurses' Aides and Gray Ladies were in attendance along with the blood donor nurses. Red Cross Staff Assistants, Motor Corps members, and volunteer workers drove donors to the Community House, helped with administration and applications, and gave food to the donors. Mrs. Fred M. Brock, chairman for the day, said, "The volunteer workers have done a wonderful job, and I don't know what we would have done without them."

Many donors were contributing third, fourth, and fifth times. One donor was giving her fifth quart. She was a nurse during the last war and one of the survivors of the Lusitania. Her son is in Ireland with the Army. When asked how she felt after the fifth time, she said, "I feel wonderful."

### Vera Zorina Booked For Ballet Festival

### Elect Klingler Head Of Hills Government

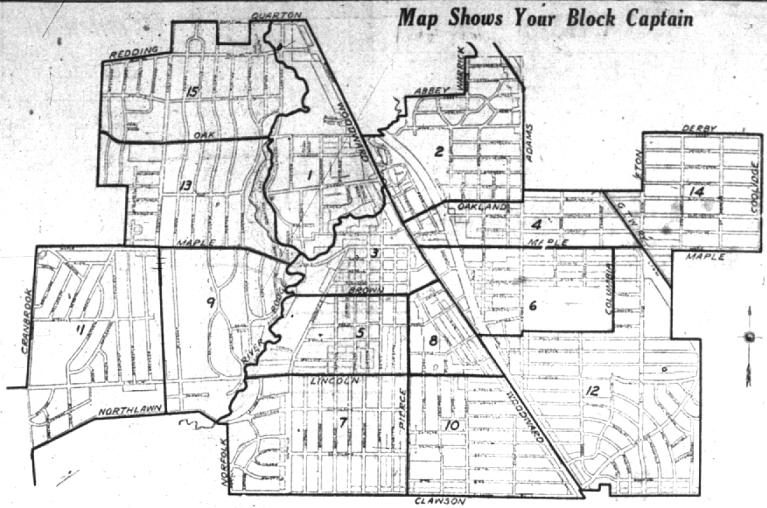
