In the welter of novel jobs one of the greatest wartaime necessities sometimes goes overlooked; women are needed to build the basic strength of the nation, to guide the children of America into the paths of demogratic living.

"We are not trying to start the old argument about woman's place. The kind of war work we have in mind may be limited to a woman's own children or it may be limited only by the total number of children in the community. To judge by the rising national delinquency figures and the number of young people who write to offices of civilian defense to ask what they can do, there is a trementous need, especially among girls, for more women to step in and provide leadership.
