"The time is now past for considering whether or not we shall have a garden. We must have gardens if we expect to maintain a full larder next winter. But gardening success is more than an interest. It is a challenge which must be met in the proper spirit with adequate information and equipment," Mrs. Avery says.

Important For Gardeners
Mrs. Avery's talk will serve as a summary for the experienced gardener and as a practical guide for the novice. Last year she returned to the garden club and this return visit is in the way of a command performance, since the club considers her particularly capable of providing necessary gardening information for its members.
