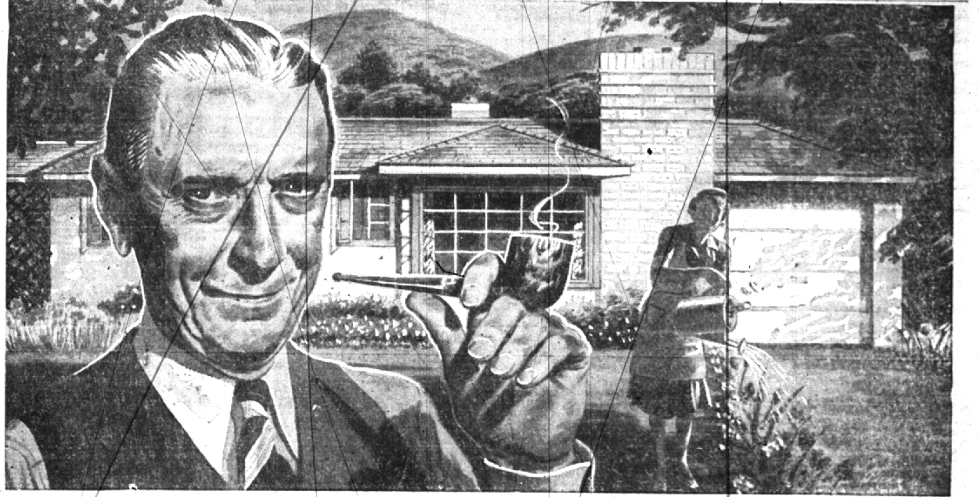
Clear Night Greet Greek Theatre Show
