## Village Variety

In the centuries past the ministry has been almost exclusively the province of men. But, as in other fields, women are expanding their sphere, and here in Birmingham we have an Episcopal deaconess, the highest post to which a woman can rise in that church. She is Miss Olive M. Robinson, assistant to the Rev. Warner L. Forsyth, rector of St. James Church.

Miss Robinson is one out of the 250 deaconesses in the United States and the only one in the Episcopal diocese of Michigan.

Born in England, Miss Robinson first became interested in this sort of a profession for herself when she was a little girl in Harrogate, Yorkshire

County, England. There were several deaconesses there and they apparently made themselves so appealing to her that she decided to make that her life's work. The late Bishop Page furthered her interests in this type of work. It was with his encouragement that she went ahead with it when she came to this country. Miss Robinson says, "I can't see why anyone would do work she did not thoroughly enjoy."

She came to this country on a visit some 18 years ago and had been here ever since. She took her scientific and further education at the University of Wisconsin. In 1926 she entered St. Faith's Deaconess School at New York. Miss Robinson finished at St. Faith's in 1928, when she went to Alpena, Mich. to Alpena for the past 15 years she has done rural missionary work. Miss Robinson's territory was that of the three counties of Montmorency, Presque Isle and Alpena. It was in these three counties that she ministered and did pastoral work at four churches. Deaconess Robinson's enjoyment in her work should be a great incentive to other women interested in ministerial work.

**Her Prerogatives**

With the job as assistant to Mr. Forsyth, Miss Robinson's duties are: head of the church school, young people's group, and she also calls on the new families in the church. Incidentally a deaconess exercises all the prerogatives of an ordained minister except the administration of the sacraments. She has lived in four different countries: Scotland, England, and Canada, and yet she feels that "Birmingham is such a unique, friendly town, quite different and 'frightfully interesting'."

Miss Robinson has been in Birmingham since the first of the year. She has made her home at the St. James rectory on Wembleton road, where she ministered and did pastoral work with Mrs. J. W. Hampton, of Wembleton, upon Mrs. Hampton's return from Washington.

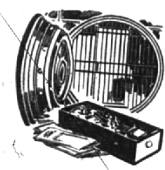
