GARDEN FOR VICTORY

The storage of many vegetables in the Victory Garden is both inexpensive and very satisfactory. Carrots, beets, late cabbage, turnips, parsnips, saifsky, rutabagas, potatoes, onions, cabbages and Brussels sprouts can be stored if the proper conditions are provided. However, the same storage conditions are not adapted for all vegetables, and for best success you must know the temperature and approximate humidity at which they should be stored.

Like It Cold
Beets, parsnips, saifsky, carrots, rutabagas and turnips should be kept very cold, preferably at a temperature of 35 degrees, but they should not be allowed to freeze. The humidity should be very high, if possible 90 to 95 percent, and if they are stored in the basement, they can best be stored in sand. If you have experienced difficulty in storing such things as carrots, rutabagas and other hard root vegetables, try coating them with paraffin. This can be done by melting the paraffin in a pan of hot water so that a thin coating of the wax floats on top. Dip the vegetables quickly into the solution so that a thin coating of paraffin forms on the outside of the vegetable. If they are dipped quickly, there is no danger of injuring them.

Apple Storage
Apples, potatoes and cabbage also need to be stored cool, but the humidity can be lower, approximately 75 to 80 percent. Apples take on odors from such other vegetables as onions, so be careful where you store them. Cabbage should be pulled roots and all the roots set in soil or sand for storage. Do not store cabbage in your basement unless your storage room is very well ventilated or the odor will permeate the house. Dry beans and onions should be kept dry and cool.

Pumpkins
Pumpkins and squash should be kept warm and dry; a temperature of about 50 degrees is very satisfactory. Parsnips, saifsky and horse radish can be left in the ground over winter. Beets, kohlrabi, turnips, carrots, rutabaga and winter radishes should be kept in moist sand or covered boxes if stored in the basement. In addition, cabbage, cauliflower and Brussels sprouts should be pulled up roots and all retained in sand if stored in the basement.

Before frost this fall, pick the tomatoes that are free from cracks but may not have ripened and place them on shelves at 50 to 55 degrees to ripen.

ORDINANCE NO. 295
City of Birmingham
AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance Number 223 of the Ordinances of the City of Birmingham, entitled Zoning Ordinance by amending Section 174 of said Ordinance.

The City of Birmingham Ordains:
Section 170I. The City Commission may, by ordinance, amend, repeal or change this Ordinance. Provided, however, that a public hearing shall be held before any such amendment, supplement or change shall be made as provided herein. That not less than fifteen days notice of the time and of such public hearing shall be given by publication in the official paper of the City, or in a paper of general circulation in the city, and hearing be granted to any person interested at the time and place specified.

If it is proposed to change, supplement or amend the ordinance, any portion of property in the area to be changed shall have the owner of property adjoining the site proposed to be altered or changed shall have the right to file such a protest in the office of the City Clerk as used in this section shall mean the property immediately adjoining the area proposed to be changed either in the rear or on the side thereof and the frontage directly opposite the frontage proposed to be altered or changed, except as used herein shall mean frontage on the street. Provided, however, that a owner lot shall not be considered to have frontage on both sides of a street only on the street where the lot has the smaller frontage. If the owner of any adjoining shifting property, there shall be included all property in a common frontage said as a single unit.

If the owners twenty or more persons of the frontage in the area proposed to be altered or changed, the frontage of property adjoining the area proposed to be altered or changed, shall file a written protest at or before the time of the hearing in this section provided, then and in such event, such amendment shall not be used except by the three-fourths vote of the City Commission.

To determine the percentage of frontage owned by owners in each of the above classifications, the sum of the frontage owned by proprietors shall be divided by the sum of all the frontages on the street frontage respectively.

If a parcel of land is owned by the estate, by joint tenants or co-tenants in common, or by legal and equitable owners, any one of such owners may file the protest for the parcel as a whole. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage upon publication thereof.

Made and passed by the Commission of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, this 16th day of August, A. D. 1943.
