

### Volunteer Fireman Praised by Mayor

Recognition of 28 years as a volunteer fireman came Monday night to Glenn Allen, 871 Ann street, when a service badge was presented to him by Mayor John E. Martz at the City Commission meeting.

Allen resigned this spring, having first joined the department in 1915 after previously working for the City in the water department. In those days, the equipment consisted of a hand-drawn fire cart. He became lieutenant of the force in 1916 and later was assistant chief.

Mayor Martz praised Allen for his long service as a volunteer. He was presented by Chief Vernon H. Griffith.

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### Five Teachers Get Adjustment

Salaries of five teachers were adjusted by the Board of Education Tuesday night.

They are Miss Gerda Hansen, Mrs. Mary Hartwick, Miss Harriet Watson and Miss Helen Swanson. Dr. Dwight H. Ireland, in recommending the increase, said that these teachers entered the system when prevailing rates were very low and are still not getting the salaries which their training and experience would give them.

### Ontonagon County Best Deer Hunting Locality in State

LANSING, Aug.—Michigan's most deer hunters, who choose their hunt for the greatest variety according to the conservation department's hunting pressure and deer kill, are glad to know that last year's conditions are now available at the department's hunting office.

The table reveals that Ontonagon county had the greatest percentage of successful hunters last year—26.4% in an area where 3,549 hunters killed 2,909 deer. Alcona county, with 22% of its 7,880 hunters bagging their buck last year, had the largest percentage of hunters among the lower percentage counties.

Roanoke county maintained its 35-year-old record of having the greatest concentration of hunters per square mile and the highest number of deer killed per square mile. The figures reveal that last year there were 22.66 hunters per square mile in Roanoke county, and 7.58 deer per square mile were killed in that county.

### WAKE UP AMERICA! Should Special Peace Terms Be Offered Axis Satellites?

As debated by William Hillman, Internationally Known Authority on European Affairs.

DR. LENGYEL OPENS: We are putting off the day of our victory by demanding unconditional surrender on the part of the Axis satellites such as Bulgaria, Hungary, Rumania and also Italy. The Nazi propaganda has found a bonanza by being able to tell these countries that unconditional surrender means total extermination. These nations react the way trapped animals do by lashing out against us, and the war is prolonged.

Most of these countries fear the Germans and prefer to join them either by high-handed leaders or because of their location in the shadow of the Nazi war machine. We can shorten the way by transforming this anti-German sentiment into pro-Allied action. We should place Italy and the satellite nations on parole so that their own attitude toward us should determine their fate. Some of them may not yet be in a position to defy the Nazis openly, but all of them can engage in passive resistance and active sabotage, forming the nucleus of a mass underground movement.

These nations should be promised that they will not be punished if they do not join themselves with their deeds; they will run no such risk if they feel the Allies have doomed them, no matter what they do. As long as we all agree that Germany is our principal enemy in Europe, we must not scorn one of our strongest potential weapons: the hatred the Nazis have inspired among their "friends."

MR. HILLMAN CHALLENGES: Holland, Belgium and Greece were also located in the shadow of the Nazi war machine and there was fear of Germany in those countries yet they did not fight Hitler as they should have. If anyone raises the fantastic argument that we must give special terms to the satellites because they did not fight us, I say to a mother of one of our soldiers: I see no justification for special consideration to Italy, Rumania or Bulgaria for their failure to fight Hitler. As a matter of fact they went to war because they hoped for help from putting off the day of our victory by demanding unconditional surrender. We will have to let the satellite nations respect force, no compromise.

DR. LENGYEL REPLIES: Holland and Belgium were in the shadow of Great Britain and France as Germany. But there is no sense in arguing about whether or not they were in the midst of a war for the life or strength of mankind. If we have the intention of overthrowing the satellites without prolonging the war I am a little bit concerned. But I believe that we should address our soldiers' mothers as Mr. Hillman is doing. We should tell them that we are organizing an underground revolt of the satellites against their Nazi masters. This cannot be done by telling them they would be hanged anyway.

MR. HILLMAN CHALLENGES: Unconditional surrender does not mean merely "unconditional military capitulation" as Mr. Hillman assumes. It may mean anything, even the total extinction of a nation. He is wrong too in assuming that opposition to unconditional surrender means opposition to punishing the Axis satellites. These countries should be punished, of course. They are guilty but they are not as guilty as the Germans who were various degrees of guilt. They are not as guilty as the Germans who unleashed all the horrors of war upon the world. They are not as guilty as the Germans who slaughtered the millions of noncombatant lives. It would be the height of cynicism to mete out the same punishment to the mass murderer as to the meek thief. Axis satellites should be punished. Punishment has defied the Nazis to the extent of refusing to go to war with Russia.

MR. HILLMAN REPLIES: It is completely unconditional military capitulation does not mean unconditional surrender. Their words mean nothing. Factually, when opposing armies surrender their arms are in a position of non-resistance. The necessary security on the defeated whatever the conditions are necessary to insure both immediate and in the future. LenGYEL's argument that the punishment of the satellites should be based on consideration of the future of the satellites for mischief. In fact that is the basis on which Germany and Italy should be punished. Punishing the leaders is intended to be a deterrent for the future. Punishment should be preventive not retaliatory in character. Hence no special terms of peace should be given any of the satellite aggressor nations. Unconditional surrender must come first.
