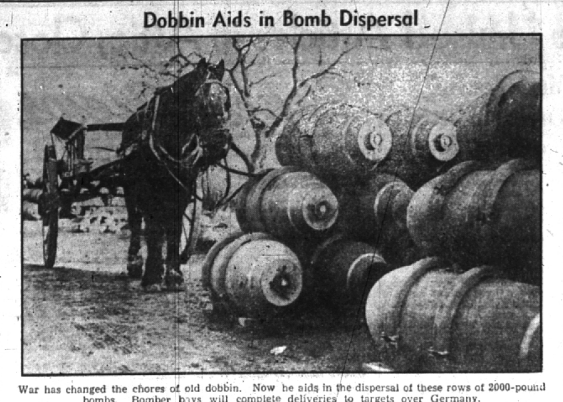

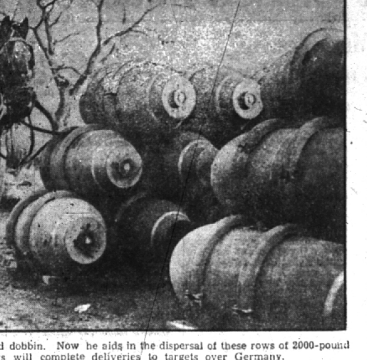
The running continuity of Mrs. Shan's class this winter has been the new spatial conception of geopolitics with emphasis on the opportunity and responsibility of the United States.

A place is waiting for each one of them. Our country needs the help of every American to win the war and to win the peace. Today, the local Girl Scout organization teaches cheerfully, relieving older persons for more important jobs. In their own troops, girls learn to make democracy work. With their sister Scouts throughout the World they look to victory and build to ward better understanding.

Each week we have tried through these columns to show you how girls in Birmingham are doing these things. Investiture Birmingham Girl Scouts, being an older sister organization, have been asked to send representatives out to the Troy Township School for the investiture of the girl troop. There are already two Brownie Troops there and one other Intermediate Scout Troop. Girls from Mrs. A. W. White, Troop No. 2, from Adams School, are being asked to go.

Announce Vacancies in Social Work Job

The State Civil Service Commission has announced new competitive examinations for the Social Worker and Social Work Administrator positions in state agencies according to information just received at the Oakland County Bureau of Social Aid. Applications to take these examinations must be filed not later than March 1, 1943, and the first tests will be given on March 29, 1943. Detroit is the examining center for this area. Salaries of the positions involved range from \$125.00 to \$325.00 per month.

There are at present sixty-one vacancies in the basic caseworker or Social Worker A2 classification and one Social Work Administrator vacancy. From the results of the examinations eligible registers will be set up to fill these and future vacancies. All previous lists established prior to January 1, 1942, will be abolished.

There is one Social Worker A2 vacancy at present in the Oakland County Bureau of Social Aid, according to L. E. Flowers, Supervisor. Within the past year there have been ten other such vacancies, six of which were filled by transfer of workers from other county bureaus or appointments from district or statewide civil service lists. This was necessary because not enough Oakland County people took the examination to fill the positions. County registers are set up for all social work positions below Administrator II, but when these are exhausted, vacancies must be filled from district or statewide registers.

Printed announcements giving detailed information regarding these positions and examinations are available at the County Clerk's office, where application blanks may also be obtained.

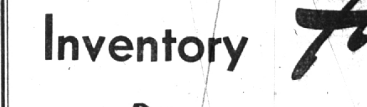
