## Red Cross Man Gives Speech

The Red Cross expenditure for this year is 50 times what it has been for previous year, said James T. Nicholson, national vice chairman of the American Red Cross, when he addressed the quarterly meeting of the Oakland County Chapter last night in the Community House.

Mr. Nicholson spent much of his time in Europe negotiating with the Nazis to accept the terms of the American Red Cross in regard to fulfilling the needs of the war victims according to want, not according to race, religion, or creed, and to see that the Red Cross provisions are distributed.

He also was a member of the delegation to Averell Harriman and Lord Beaverbrook to Moscow during the siege of that city. He said, "The Russian people will allow nothing to divert them from their war effort." He told of dining with Stalin and hearing him toast Roosevelt and ending with a toast to God.

The forces of destruction in this country are as devastating as those he has seen in Europe, Mr. Nicholson believes. These forces are smugness, selfishness, indifference, self-satisfaction.

During the last 20 years of Red Cross administering at disasters, there has been a disaster every four days and during the past year, there has been a disaster every two days. Mr. Nicholson declared.
