

Will Train Youths For Farm Work

LANSING—Michigan's civilian defense organization is being called upon by the War Manpower Commission to handle two important assignments in agriculture and industry.

County councils of defense are being asked to form Youth Labor Committees to carry out a program of recruiting, organizing, training and placing young people to assist with farm work in the 1943 season.

C. V. Ballard, chairman of the Agriculture Advisory Committee of the Michigan Council of Defense, is a member of a special state committee set up under War Manpower Commission auspices to direct the work. Dorr Stack, of the Department of Public Instruction, is chairman of the committee, on which the United States Employment Service, the Farm Security Administration and number of other agencies are represented.

Members of the state committee are to meet with the county committees in the near future to help them plan their programs in the light of local needs. Complete instructions and forms and printed materials will be given to each committee.

Members of Victory Speakers Bureaus in a number of industrial cities faced with an impending shortage of manpower are preparing to carry on a special recruiting campaign with the assistance of the U. S. Employment Service. Speakers will make their appearances a key part of their campaigns.

Church School Will Meet in Afternoon

Church school teachers, officers, and students of Embury Methodist Church voted unanimously to change the time of meeting each Sunday from 9 a. m. to 12 p. m. Lee Weldon, superintendent, said that this has been necessary because the early hour of meeting had hurt the church school since the new year time was instituted. With many parents working afternoon or midnight shifts, many young people working on Saturdays and Sundays and with many working six or seven days a week, the early hour seemed impractical. The new time of meeting, which begins this Sunday, will meet the needs of all groups. The Board of Missions, the church school, the Bible class, the adult group, has voted to back the new program, and the teachers and officers of students have likewise shown their hearty approval.

Eat Fresh Produce, Save Tin Cans

Oakland County housewives can save enough steel to buy a new machine simply by replacing one can of fruit or vegetables a week during the coming year with fresh or home-packed produce, a leading food distributor estimated today.

"This substitution, urged by the War Production Board, will not only save steel but also conserve food by using extra supplies of fresh produce made available by increased production, canning restrictions and reduced storage facilities," according to Earl R. French of the Atlantic Commission Company.

A number two "tin" can averages 235 pounds of steel plus a small amount of tin, and a single family can save 12.2 pounds of steel in a year by the can-wax reduction, French said. Thus Oakland County's 65,860 families can save 815,692 pounds of steel, enough to make 23,403 thirty-gallon machine guns, each requiring 35 pounds of steel for manufacture, he pointed out.

Invite All Pastors To U. of M. Rally Starting Jan. 18

ANN ARBOR, Mich.—The Fourth American Pastors' Conference will be held at the University of Michigan, starting Monday, Jan. 18, and concluding Friday, Jan. 22, at the University of Michigan. Invitations to attend have been extended to the 2,500 ministers of various denominations in the State of Michigan.
The conference is sponsored by the Michigan Council of Churches and Christian Education and the Extension Service of the University of Michigan. The Honorable H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies on the University campus will be the headquarters for the conference.
Dr. Nels F. S. Ferris, of Andover-Newton Seminary, at Newton-Center, Mass., will give a series of theological lectures which will stress the main theme of the conference: His talks will be entitled "Christianity and Truth," "Christianity and the Individual," "Christianity and the Church" and "Christianity and Society." Dr. Roswell P. Barnes, a secretary of the Federal Council of Churches in America, is scheduled for two addresses, one on "War-time Service Program of Churches," and the other on "The Church—First Priority."
