

Problems of Draft-Age High School Boys to Be Discussed at Meeting

State, University Officials Called By P.-T. A. Council

The high school boys in the draft is one of America's major problems today. "Where is he going? How soon will he enter combat training? Will he come back to school at the end of the war?" These are some of the questions one hears on the street, in the home and in the school.

Citizens of Birmingham may hear of these problems discussed at a city-wide Parent-Teacher meeting in the auditorium of Baldwin High School Monday, Jan. 25. The Birmingham Parent-Teacher council is sponsoring the meeting which is open to all interested persons without admission charge.

George H. Fern, director of the State Board of Control for Vocational Education, and Clark Tibbitts, executive secretary of the University of Michigan War board, will come to join Dr. Ireland in a panel discussion of this wartime situation for student draftees. The panel discussion will be the special feature of the program to begin at 8 o'clock. The Baldwin High School band will provide music.

Luncheon Serves Dual Purpose

The Universities of the United States, its high schools and its state vocational districts quickly sensed their responsibilities in the war crisis. They came to the fore in rearranging school curricula, at once setting up special pre-induction courses to prepare the boy soon to enter the service.
